Challenge 1: At the top of page is the Music Service logo. Can you design us a new logo, using a maximum of 4 colours and keeping the name the same either using your computer or by hand drawing design a logo that represents what you think the Music Service means to you.

Challenge 2: Make up a song. Choose some words to create a song to one of the tunes that we have learned to play this year, something catchy that could help other children to learn a piece like with some of the tune we learned this year. Either write down the words and let me know which piece they are to go with, or record yourself singing the tune.

Challenge 3: Use items from round your house to create your own music. Maybe a saucepan drum kit, or try filling glass bottles with different amounts of water and tap them with a wooden spoon, how does the sound change?

Think about:

Pitch – high or low sounds Dynamics / volume – loud and quiets

Tempo – the speed of your music Pulse – the steady beat throughout your music.

Challenge 4: Keep a Diary of all the music you listen to. See if you can find the following types of music.

Jazz – Blues – pop – rock – minimalist – a duet – an orchestra – a brass band – a quartet – a march – a fugue - film music – a waltz – classical music – music from another country – folk music -

What is similar? What is different?

Challenge 5: Explore who writes the music – create a fact sheet about a composer. When did they live? Did they play an instrument? What style of music did they write?


